We have been having a great and enjoyable experience with the study of the Word of God and we welcome individuals who would like to join or visit.


The Thursday Bible study is held on zoom from 7:30 - 8:30pm.

Stewards' Report

I would like to start with a big thank you to the stewards for their continued support, and for once again stepping in when I couldn't carry out my duties at late notice. At this point I want to say that it has been a privilege to serve St Andrew's in this capacity, but it is with deep regret that, due to returning problems with my breathing, I feel that I need to step down from my duties and take a back seat. I will continue to support and help wherever I can, but I need to lessen the responsibility and reduce the stress I have been feeling. The stewards continue to give much valued support to the Church in many ways and we thank God for their willingness to serve.

Property Report

In October the security alarm and the fire alarm were serviced. It was noted that the system, on the security alarm that alerts either Revd John or Revd Blair has been disabled. I note that these two alarm systems are maintained by different companies. Is there any reason for this, or could we get a better deal if the services wee carried out by one company?

I have been concerned about the fire safety in the building and asked the Fire Prevention Officer from Harlow Fire Station to meet me, which he did on 17th November. He pointed out a lot of things that needed to be done, including fire doors to be fitted, gangways to be cleared, fire exit signs to be clearer, plus other important issues. He said that that the church must get a fire assessment done, which was arranged by Morgan Fire. I was told to be prepared to give up a day to be with this person, as it was a big job. I met the assessor at 10.30 a.m. and he left before 2 p.m. The report, costing £750, was not received until early February and was, to say the least, very unhelpful stating that we needed fire doors but not specifying which ones. The Fire Prevention Officer had said we must have steel shutters form kitchen to hall and from hall to corridor - the assessor did not mention these. He did, however, say that the fire door from the first floor to the balcony was unsatisfactory, but no comment was made as to what should be done to improve it. He told me that, if we needed a specific report on fire doors, that would be a different survey and that his job was just to point out the risks, which to me, were fairly obvious. I have since contacted Harlow Fire Prevention and have been told that someone will meet me to give stronger advice. I wait to see.

The leaking water heater in the back gents' toilets was replaced. Work was carried out by Richard Burbridge to the front gents' toilet; clearing large damp area in the cubicle, rubbing down walls and repainting – also fitting an extractor fan. Other works completed by Richard were: working on the corridor behind the stage, redecorating the damp ceiling by the chapel and repainting the walls. Also repairing holes to Room 3 ceiling and fitting LED lighting.

Both boilers were serviced by Sterling Gas, who also fitted a sump pump in the boiler room to stop any further flooding there. I would point out that the boiler service is an annual requirement.

Yet to be done at the end of April is a full electrical survey. This is a five year legal requirement.

Envelopes and Gift Aid Secretary's Report

Based on figures supplied by the Treasurer, I have worked out the income from all offertory sources for the 2023-24 financial year, and from that the expected Gift Aid refund that we can claim. The results are as shown in the following table. I have also included for comparison figures from the last full year before the onset of Covid (2018-19) and first full year after Covid (2022-23). The offertory income includes all regular donations from envelope holders, standing orders, direct payments to bank, 'loose' collections on Sundays and *ad hoc* contributions via various channels.

From the table we can see that, after the hiatus brought about by Covid, our offertory income has indeed returned to pre-Covid level, (in numerical terms without considering the effect of inflation). We would like to thank the generosity of all our regular subscribers and other donors for sustaining the church's finances during those difficult three years.

Currently, we have 28 members on the envelope scheme and 15 members offering via Standing Orders or BACS, making a total of 43. In comparison, for the last full year before Covid (2018-19), the corresponding figure was 54. We have lost over a dozen regular donors in the past few years. The effect is most apparent in our Gift Aid income.

As can be seen in the table above, our Gift Aid claim is some 6% down compared with what we were able to achieve some years back, despite the fact that through our concerted drive for more Gift Aiders we have increased its membership from 29 in 2018 to 34 at present. A few more Gift Aiders would have been most helpful.

So, if you have not done so already, please consider putting your donations on Gift Aid. This gives the church the ability to increase the value of your contribution, at no additional cost to yourselves, by up to 25%, which will be much appreciated and valued.

Lettings and Buildings use

This year I want to reflect on the use of our building and not just give a brief summary of our lettings.

Our worship life is centred on our regular Sunday worship --its importance shown on Easter Sunday with 60 adults and 8 children and probably a further 7-8 people on zoom. The buzz of conversation in the entrance and over coffee etc in the hall is significant.

Our fellowship continued in The Ghanaian Methodist Fellowship and the bible studies on Monday and Tuesday and the monthly pop-in prayer and Spud and Pud lunches.

Tuesdays in term-time sees the hall busy with Stars for parents and carers with young children and then in the afternoon the 3rd Harlow Guides.

The Methodist commitment to alcohol-free premises makes us an appropriate venue for the series of six Alcoholics Anonymous groups that meet on our premises , particularly important for those who need an alcohol-free space on Christmas Day.

Our church sanctuary is used three Sundays a month in the afternoon by a Tamil congregation, and from time to time by other Christian groups for special worship.

Our service to the community means that on Wednesdays the hall is the venue for Activity Groups providing mental, physical and social activities for those with problems of age. We provide space too for courses for those with the physical problem of diabetes two short courses run over consecutive weeks by the NHS for those already diagnosed, and a longer spread out pre-diabetes course run on behalf of the NHS.

Cultural activities have their place to in our building with its good acoustics with the Harlow Brass Band who rehearse in the hall each week and use the church for a Spring and a Christmas concert each year, and the New Edition choir who use our premises as one of their venues for summer and winter concerts . We continue to be a venue for ABRSM music exams.

As part of our service to the community we provide a suitable location for family activities such as children's birthday parties since our hall provides a safe space for among other things a bouncy castle; and at the other end of life the hall is a good venue for "celebration of life" events. Rooms One and Three provide suitable spaces for a number of other community groups.

Our charges make a significant contribution to the maintenance of our building, but as part of the extended church's work are not, and cannot be, at commercial rates.

All these contribute to the witness of St Andrews to Christ in our community and will provide a basis for developing our mission in the future.

Christian Aid Week 2024 is on 12th-18th May. St. Andrew's Church will follow our tradition of supporting this event with the following activities:

The 2023 event at St. Andrew's collected a total of £842.55, made up of online donations (£160.00), envelopes with cheques & cash donations (£610.55), and Christian Aid lunch intake (£72). Of the total, £695.00 are Gift Aided, giving a tax rebate of £173.75.

Harlow Foodbank

During 2023, a total of £946 in cash and cheques donations was sent to the Michael Roberts Charitable Trust to be used for the work of Harlow Foodbank. My thanks go to Andrew Wong who has inspected the accounts.

I am told that we now receive very few donations of food brought to St Andrews for Foodbank. What does come is collected by Alison and Kevin Brand and is transported to the depot at Houlsham Hall Farm at Matching Tye. Our donations of money are therefore all the more important to maintain the important work of Harlow Foodbank in helping to provide emergency basic food supplies for individuals and families in extreme need. The simplest way to make a donation in the name of St Andrews Methodist Church is by putting cash in an envelope with your name and address (email address if you have one) in an envelope and handing it to Hazel Taylor. She will pass it to me and I will acknowledge every donation I receive. If you need to write a cheque it should be made out to 'Michael Roberts Charitable Trust'.
