Dear Friends,

For some people, last Christmas was a joy while for others, it was a moment of grief. In most of these situations, the new year brings a lot of uncertainties – family life, economic life, work and relationships.

I have been reflecting on the future for some time, and I'm reminded of a conversation Moses had with God in Exodus chapter 33 versus 12 to 17. It is as follows:

Moses said to God, "Look, you tell me, 'Lead this people,' but you don't let me know whom you're going to send with me. You tell me, 'I know you well and you are special to me.' If I am so special to you, let me in on your plans. That way, I will continue being special to you. Don't forget, this is your people, your responsibility."

God said, "My presence will go with you. I'll see the journey to the end."

Moses said, "If your presence doesn't take the lead here, call this trip off right now. How else will it be known that you're with me in this, with me and your people? Are you travelling with us or not? How else will we know that we're special, I and your people, among all other people on this planet Earth?"

God said to Moses: "All right. Just as you say; this also I will do, for I know you well and you are special to me. I know you by name" (The Message Bible)

I wonder how many of us would take the trouble to ask God for his leading in the year 2025. What made Moses special in the eyes of God was that he desired to know God's will for his life and for the people that he was leading. He wanted to be in God's plans. Moses was an ordinary person like any of us but his relationship with God made him special. He communicated through prayer and listened to God's words.

Interestingly, we can also depend on God for his leading in the coming year. He teaches us his will by the words of the scriptures, through people, through events and situations. All we need to do is to be sensitive to him and his Spirit. One of the things we can do is to pray to him frequently.

The year 2025 may be a year of uncertainties but you can overcome these uncertainties with trust. First 'trust in the Lord and lean not on your own understanding'. Trust that God will lead you into the year as an overcomer. Secondly, trust in yourself. You can move beyond and above all the negativity that surrounds you by trusting in your abilities, skills and talents. Thirdly, encourage others to trust God after you have overcome.

He rarely came to class, just told students to read the book.


Some say He had His son stand in for Him, to teach the class.

# EDITOR'S LETTER

# Dear Friends,

With Lent beginning on 5th March, I've been reading a book by Paul Mallard called *An Anchor for the Soul*. The whole slim book is based on Psalm 22. This Psalm seems to describe Christ's crucifixion. But King David wrote it almost 500 years before this barbaric form of torture and death had been invented. And David lived over one thousand years before Jesus died on the cross.



Paul Mallard was a teacher in the days when RE included the teaching of the Gospels. Each year before Easter, he would print out Psalm 22 for each of his class of thirteen and fourteen year olds, but without any reference to where it came from or who wrote it. He posed three questions to the class, What is it about? When do you think it was written and who do you think wrote it? Over the five years of teaching RE he got very similar answers.

- 1. It's about Jesus dying on the cross.
- 2. They all agreed it was written after Good Friday, some thought immediately, and the rest between five and fifty years after Jesus' death.
  - 3. Most had no idea who wrote it but some suggested Peter, Paul or John.

Do read the Psalm for yourself, it's only 31 verses, and discover anew one of the amazing things about the Bible. The Holy Spirit enabled people to write surprising, unimaginable things.

I have been going to church all my life, so over the years the ignominy and shame of crucifixion has dulled in my mind. The amazing thing Christ did had remained with me, which the book also emphasises, but it reminded me just how awful this death was. Under the law of Moses, any Jew who was executed was displayed to indicate that the person was under the curse of God. It was decreed that Roman citizens should not even hear the word 'cross'. So the early Christians, preaching about a crucified Saviour, sometimes did so in fear and trembling. It was only with the Holy Spirit's help that they could boldly go to Jews and Gentiles, and preach Christ crucified.

St Paul says, in 1 Corinthians 1: 22-23 'For indeed Jews ask for signs and Greeks search for wisdom: but we preach Christ crucified, to Jews a stumbling block and to Gentiles foolishness, ...'

Verse 27 of psalm 22 says: 'All the ends of the earth will remember and turn to the Lord, and all the families of the nations will worship before You.'

We at St Andrew's are one of the families of the nations and we worship Jesus Christ, our Lord and Saviour. This Psalm looks forward to the end of time as well as describing an event in history which happened over 2000 years ago.

I recommend this book as a meditation before Easter: *An Anchor for the Soul* by Paul Mallard, ISBN: 978-1-915705-33-4. Cost with postage, online around £6.80.

Bill James, Principal of the London Seminary, commented on the book. "We are invited to reflect in a fresh way on Christ. More than that, we see that the sufferings and glory of Christ provide the keys to our own Christian life and experience. Spiritually refreshing!"

# **JAMES IN A PAGE by Arthur Revels**

The epistle of James is about Godly behaviour and Christian living. In this short epistle of five chapters, James managed to cram so much in. Although there are four James recorded in the New Testament, the author is believed to be James, the step brother of Jesus.

At one time James was sceptical about Jesus but later he became leader of the Jerusalem church and is mentioned in Acts 15. In a meeting with Paul and Barnabas, James concluded that it was not necessary to become a Jew to come to God. It was written to Jewish Christians who were dispersed throughout the Roman Empire.

The martyrdom of James is recorded by the secular historians. He was taken to the top of the temple and pushed off but survived (remember the temptation of Jesus), he was then stoned to death but did not die and finally killed by a blow to the head from a Roman soldier.

The key verse in this book is 2.18:-

But someone will say, you have faith and I have works, show me your faith apart from your works and I will show you my faith by my works.

Faith without works is dead. We are not saved by following the law but by grace, a free gift of salvation to those who believe and repent. Salvation cannot be earned by good works but only through the suffering of Jesus on the cross. But we need to demonstrate our faith by our works. Unless we demonstrate our faith by our good works, our faith is meaningless. If we have Jesus truly in our hearts good works will automatically follow.

James also stresses that we should be doers of the word not just hearers (verse 1.22). Our Christian living should be based on the teaching of Jesus. We need to act on the word of God and in all aspects of life follow Jesus. There is a saying that a bible falling to bits belongs to somebody who is not falling to bits. It is a book to be cherished and studied to change our lifestyles.

James considers the human tongue needs taming. There are so many arguments that are caused by remarks made from our tongues. We need to be careful what we say and avoid gossip. The latter has been the cause of disagreements and splits in many churches. To quote James `for every kind of beast and bird, of reptile and sea creature can be tamed and has been tamed by mankind but no human being can tame the tongue. It is a restless evil, full of deadly poison` (4.7-8). One of my personal hates is bad language and the use of a certain four letter word which appears to be acceptable in broadcasts - but not by me.

James has much more to say about patience, not to discriminate between rich and poor or judge a person by what a person is wearing, gives a warning to the rich and the dangers of worldliness. It is a book that requires careful study and reflection and applied to our lives today. Please read it for yourself.

I love what Vernon McGee says in his commentary on James: `The world today is not reading the bible but they are reading you and me. Someone has expressed it poetically –

The gospel is written a chapter a day,

By deeds that you do and words that you say,

Men read what you say – whether faithless or true,

Say what is the gospel to you?
