

The good news is that we have started already by looking at how hospitable we are as a church and individuals at the last Café service.

EDITOR'S LETTER

A VISIT TO DERBYSHIRE

The drive from Tideswell to Chelmorton is winding and wonderful, so long as you haven't got a local-in-a-hurry following too close to your boot! We had left Harlow a few days before in unseasonably freezing weather. Winter clothes in May but as forecast, each day had become warmer and now it was hot! Susan and David welcomed us to their house on the side of a hill with picture-book views. This hill is part of a Neolithic burial mound called Chelmorton Low, "Low" being deceptive as they are most of the way up and it's almost 1500 feet above sea level at the top. A Low in Derbyshire signifies an ancient place of burial.

They don't use the front door of their home in spring as the swifts nest in their porch every year. They took us for a tour of the garden, and we could see progress in the two years since we last visited. As well as some lovely mature trees it was covered in ground elder, nettles and rough grass. Susan has extended the kitchen garden recently and has put chicken wire round some of the plants to deter the rabbits. They also have moles which like digging across the large grass area that David mows regularly. It's quite a steep walk up to the top seating area, with a large flower bed to one side and fruit bushes spread out on the other. They have also cleared an area and have 20 solar panels on the ground, which provide their electricity and they sell the rest to the grid, when the sun is shining. Because they are in a National Park Area they weren't allowed to have panels on the roof.

Their garden has one of the only three mature elm trees in the whole area, the rest succumbing to Dutch Elm disease. They have added to the fruit trees we gave them when they left Harlow and Susan has started an arboretum. They still have their two beehives and will be able to start taking honey again this year. Unfortunately they found Himalayan Balsam last year, which is a prohibited species in this country so you mustn't let it seed. Susan spent hours pulling it out and this year she has only found six plants, so far.

They have also made great strides in the house, with rooms completed now which were just shells two years ago, or with the doorway only just knocked through. David has laid a beautiful wooden floor in the dining room and has the wood blocks ready to do the prep-room and kitchen. He has recovered well from his stroke although he doesn't have as much energy.

We met them again on the Sunday at their church in Buxton and enjoyed worshipping in an Evangelical Anglican Church with a large congregation. We shared in lively singing, with Susan in the Music Group and also doing the Bible reading, and David on washing up duty after church. We were made so welcome at their home and church, and they send their best wishes to all their friends at St Andrew's.

Christian Aid Week - 1978 Style

Hazel showed me the following photo which was taken from the local papers describing a sponsored fast that young people from Harlow churches undertook in May 1978 as part of the activities to raise money for Christian Aid Week.

The following is an excerpt from the newspaper: -

"Fasters bring in £100. Harlow youngsters got Christian Aid Week off to a good start on Sunday.

They raised over £100 with a sponsored fast which lasted for 10 hours.

About 30 young people were involved from the youth groups of St Andrew's, St Mary at Latton and St James Churches. Parents of some of the fasters were also sponsored by the hour.

Most of the day's activity centred around a workman's hut set up in The Stow where the youngsters got on with revising while maintaining their fast.

Despite the temptation of fish and chips, and other food offered from passers-by, nearly everyone lasted the full 10 hours and tucked in to hot soup and bread in St Andrew's at the end of the fast."

To put this into context, £100 was no small feat; this sum in 1978 is worth a staggering £1072 in today's money!

Hazel asked various people, including her daughter Jenny, who is in the photo, and here's what they came up with.

Sitting in front row right to left: Jason Longville, Sally Torkildsen, Dewi Hanks, behind him is Megan Hanks. We don't know the next 4 to the left or the 2 behind big notice. Jenny Taylor with glasses and Julia Longville with hand on her shoulder. The 2 boys standing, playing are Jeremy and Jonathan Broxholme, probably Jeremy at front. They are not sure of the rest. Can anyone from the church help to identify some more faces?

Random Thoughts on Diversity – Cultural, Ethnic or Otherwise (part 1)

21st May every year is designated by United Nations as 'World Day of Cultural Diversity'. To mark this occasion, a celebratory service was held at St. Andrew's on 18th. It was heart-warming to see all the ladies dressed up in their colourful national costumes for the event. It also prompted me to ask myself what, if anything, I have done through my working life in promoting, or at least adhering to the principles of, diversity.

For the 30 odd years that I have worked in this country, I was fortunate enough to be at the premier facility at Old London Road, Harlow, the research centre which had been involved in the invention or development of a great many of the technologies in use in the world today. Within my little group, apart from scientists and engineers from the four home nations, over the years, I had welcomed Indians, Pakistanis and an Afrikaner. In the wider company, there were scientists from all over Europe: Germany, Poland, Greece, Czechoslovakia, Norway, Ukraine and, from further afield, China, Singapore and New Zealand. Thus, there was an atmosphere of a happy family comprising of varying cultures and talents, all contributing in their special ways with their different styles of operation. But notably, there were no one of African or Afro-Caribbean heritage. Every year, there were literally thousands of application forms flooding in from university graduates seeking employment in the electronics sector, but, again, applicants from Africa or the Caribbean were notably absent.

I asked myself why this was so. The company was not discriminatory, embracing ethnic diversity to the full. Eventually, I came to the conclusion that preconceived ideas, expectations and stereotyping by parents and schoolteachers must have played a major role in creating this anomaly. This theory is amply illustrated by the following story which I heard on BBC World Service.

The radio programme I am referring to is called "Life Scientific", where each episode features a prominent scientist who relates their life's evolution from childhood to becoming a leading professional who could play a significant part in contributing to their country and the wider world in their chosen field. One such episode featured a black mathematician in the UK who was fascinated by mathematics at a young age, and after graduation, worked at a large pharmaceutical company to compile statistical data in the quality control of drug manufacture, using models created by other mathematicians. The job was mundane and not very inspiring, and at one annual review, he was encouraged by the company to make progress by doing a PhD in mathematics. So he went for an interview at the university of his choice, but afterwards, the admission tutor told him that he did not have the qualities to become a top mathematician, and his application was turned down. He went home feeling totally dejected and just wanted to put his head down and returned to his mundane job for the rest of his life.

Then the presenter asked him what made him change his mind, pick up the pieces and try again. He said it was entirely due to one incident at his four-year old son's school when the boy was asked by the teacher what he wanted to be when he grew up. His son replied, "I want to be a mathematician", to which the teacher said, "I don't think so, but you could be a footballer or singer". When his son told him what happened at school, he made up his mind to become a top mathematician and that he was doing this for his son. To cut a long story short, after many years of struggling, he did succeed and became the Principal Mathematical Modeller for a major multinational engineering company, and is currently also serving as the President of the Institute of Mathematics and its Applications. Famously he is one of just a handful of esteemed mathematicians, and the first black mathematician, to be featured in 'Who's Who', Britain's book of prominent people. What an inspiring yet rather disturbing story, I would say.

So, this is my plea to all parents and teachers, especially those who have responsibilities for giving advice to young people on their future careers: Please do not let your own preconceptions and stereotyping prejudice influence the guidance you give. The youngsters deserve to have the freedom to explore every opportunity without hindrance, to develop their talents to the full, thus enabling them to make the best possible contribution to society in their chosen way.

Report on results from the Café Worship - 18th May by Jordan Stringer

Firstly, I want to say thank you those who were able to come to the café worship on Sunday 18th May when we looked at the First Impressions Count and Welcome. I have gathered feedback from our attendees regarding their experiences within our church environment, the hospitality audit and action sheet. I would like to share a summary of the key points that were highlighted.

Post It Note Reflections

This document reflects participants' experiences and feedback regarding a church environment, highlighting positive aspects as well as areas for improvement.

Positive Welcoming Atmosphere

Many attendees felt welcomed and appreciated the friendly and kind nature of the congregation. They noted the warm greetings at the door and the availability of tea and coffee after services, contributing to a sense of belonging.

Concerns About Accessibility

Feedback indicated issues with accessibility for individuals with visual impairments, such as the lack of braille hymn books and poor sound quality. Additionally, some participants expressed feelings of being ignored or not welcomed adequately, suggesting a need for more inclusive practices.

Hospitality Audits

As part of the service, members of the congregation also completed a hospitality audit consisting of 15 questions. They were required to score each question by choosing from the following options: 3 – Excellent, 2 – Some room for improvement, and 1 – Oh Dear/Don't know.

Upon reviewing the results, it was interesting to observe the congregation's views on the hospitality at St Andrews. One notable positive is that approximately 95% of respondents indicated that there are individuals stationed at the main entrance to greet those arriving at the church. However, 56% of respondents suggested that there is room for improvement in how members of the congregation see themselves as hosts and their readiness to welcome newcomers.

This feedback indicates that, to enhance the welcome experience for new attendees, we must focus on improving the interactions among ourselves. Additionally, over 70% of respondents felt uncertain about whether the leadership team has feedback from visitors and those who have become regular churchgoers. This highlights an area that requires attention to ensure we are continuously improving our hospitality practices.

Action Sheets

There is much to discuss from the Action Sheets, especially since both questions have multiple parts.

Part 1

First, we need to address our weak points and improve them. A recurring issue is that Stewards on duty are not easily identifiable. I proposed to Reverend Frank that we introduce name lanyards for all Stewards, including those at the doors. This will help new attendees recognize team members and feel welcomed. Another point raised was about providing direction. Newcomers might find it helpful if Stewards or door attendants guide them to seats, reducing their

anxiety. Clear instructions during services, like when to stand or sit, would also be beneficial. Lastly, regarding feedback forms, I believe informal conversations with myself, or other leadership members could be more effective than constant surveys or tick boxes. This approach would help us improve the welcome experience and ensure no one feels ignored. *Part* 2

The second part of the action sheet addresses the experiences people have when visiting an unfamiliar place and what can be learned from these experiences. It also identifies key factors to consider and suggests individuals who you can discuss these observations with.

Thoughts, experiences, and observations should be shared by speaking with the minister in charge and communicating with the church stewards. These issues can then be brought up during stewards or church council meetings.

As briefly mentioned in Part 1, anxiety about visiting an unfamiliar place can offer insights into how individuals might feel apprehensive or uneasy about attending a service because they are unfamiliar with the building, attendees, procedures, and protocols. It is important to consider how to support those who may feel anxious when they first visit St Andrews to help them feel welcomed.

Another lesson from people's experiences of being in an unfamiliar place is the importance of not assuming that visitors know what to do upon arrival, as they may feel lost. Providing a warm welcome can help someone who initially feels lost, uncomfortable, or scared to feel like they belong.

How are we going to improve our welcome?

To enhance our welcome, it is essential that we engage with individuals within the congregation who we may not know as well. By making efforts to understand them and their cultures we can foster a more inclusive environment. Although I recognise that it may be challenging to get to know everyone due to the size of our congregation, focusing on building relationships with a small group of people from the congregation can reduce feelings of being ignored or invisible.

A proposal from the action sheet suggests organizing a service where everyone wears 'name badges and participates in a Café-style worship'. This setting would facilitate interactions, allowing members to ask questions, learn about each other, and share personal testimonies. Additionally, the action sheet highlighted the idea of integrating different congregations. While the exact method for achieving this remains uncertain, one possibility could be hosting an international meal.

Conclusion

To conclude, improving our welcome at St Andrews involves several key actions. Firstly, we should try to sit with and get to know members of the congregation we may not be familiar with, including learning about their cultures. While it may be challenging to know everyone due to the size of our congregation, focusing on small groups can help alleviate feelings of being ignored or invisible.

In the middle of East Anglia, north west of Cambridge, there is a town called March. The first part of the riddle is solved because the boys were born in that town.



Foodbank has no cold storage facilities at their warehouse and they are not able to use items that are out-of-date or where the seal has been broken.

Our thanks go to Alison and Kevin Brand who arrange the transporting of food donations, to Andrew Wong for examining the cash accounts and to Hazel Taylor who is willing to pass on your donations to me. We need more regular donors because, although £700 is a very large amount to give to Foodbank, the need is great and the work must continue. We have recently lost several generous donors who have helped to boost our annual giving to more than £1000 in most years, so we need other new donors to give regularly, if you can, or whenever you are able.
